What do you think of local services?



During the 3 months from October to December, we spoke to 905 people.

You told us about 352 experiences (both good and bad) which you'd had when using health and social care services in the city.

On the next page, you can find out what difference your comments have made.

What difference have your comments made?



Here are some examples of the difference to services your comments have made.

Nationally

We were approached by a member of staff from a large health organisation in Sheffield who had a number of concerns about the place where they worked. We supported them to voice their concerns to the Care Quality Commission and made sure that their concerns would be promptly investigated.

Locally

We supported Sheffield City Council who were rewriting the information they provide to people receiving adult social care. Our comments have helped to change the way people will receive information.

To Providers of Local Services

We raised a Health and Safety issue with a provider on one of our Enter and View visits and asked them to take immediate action to put things right. The provider was happy to do so, and thanked us for pointing out the risk to people visiting their premises.


To Individuals and the Public

We were contacted by a lady who needs additional support to access some training which will help her manage her health condition. She had been told that the additional support could not be provided, so we asked the service to look into it again. They have now found a way to get the lady the support that she needs, and she is arranging to attend the course.

Gathering People's Views

Event for People from Black and Minority Ethnic Communities

In December we held an event bringing together people from BME communities to find out about their experiences of health and social care. 24 people came along and people from lots of different communities had an opportunity to have their say.



As always with Healthwatch, it was a lively event with lots of discussion. We explored what people thought was good, bad, and could be better, about a range of primary care and secondary care services including: access to primary care (e.g. GPs, dentists, opticians, pharmacies) and secondary care (e.g. hospitals), mental health services and social care.

What we are doing with the information we gathered?

Attendees told us about a variety of issues and we aim to produce a briefing on the event and key findings. We are going to use this information to inform our work and share this with key partners, including Sheffield's Equality Engagement Group.

We will use what people told us about mental health alongside the analysis of our mental health survey, to see if there are any further trends.

The information shared with us on Adult Social Care was shared with Sheffield Scrutiny Committee as part of their work on social care.

Gathering People's Views (cont.)

Reaching those 'hidden' voices

Each quarter we are focusing on hearing the views of those people or groups whose voices can be missed. Over the past few months we've been talking to people who are homeless or have experienced homelessness, which has included visits to the Archer Project, Rough Sleeper service and BME groups at SADACCA.

We will be producing briefings on our key findings and sharing these with key decision makers and commissioners to help inform their work.

Update: Young Healthwatch

Young Healthwatch is for everyone up to 25 years old. We work with Chilypep young people's project to deliver Young Healthwatch activities.

Young People's Mental Health Conference

Mental Health is one of the priority areas that Young Healthwatch are focusing on. We held a mini conference in November 2015 and 32 people came along.



Young Healthwatch members talked about their work and there was then a panel discussion with professionals from Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS), Sheffield MIND, the Health and Social Care Trust, Mental Health Matters and VoiceAbility.

They also held a discussion about the Children's Health and Wellbeing Board Blueprint for 2015-20. A briefing on the event will be published on our website in the next few weeks.

Update: Young Healthwatch (cont.)

Listening to other young people

Young Healthwatch members have also been out and about talking to other groups of young people, to find out what they think is good/bad about the health and social care services they use.

They've been to talk to 24 young people from "hidden groups" including young people who are homeless, LGBT and young carers. We have planned some further visits to talk to looked-after children/care leavers, refugees and asylum seekers, and a young women's housing project.

We have asked the groups what could be done to make services better. The most popular suggestion was about communication, with 9 young people saying services should let young people talk more and that the services should be better at listening. Other suggestions included reducing waiting times and the need to show respect to young people, rather than patronise them.

Young Healthwatch will publish a full report in March 2016.
